Dear LUMC Family,

Homecoming starts this month. One of my favorite texts in Luke is Luke 4:14-30, which is the story of Jesus' homecoming. Be sure to take a minute to read the scripture once you're done reading this. But this is how I imagine some of the gaps in that story. It is Homecoming in Nazareth, and everyone is excited because the hometown hero, Jesus, is coming back. Stories of Jesus had spread throughout Nazareth, and everyone was proud of him. They remembered when he was a little boy and would talk in church. And they remember the first sermon he gave in the synagogue at 8. They were sad to see him go but knew he would do great things. Being a savvy one, the Rabbi knew his congregation would love to hear from Jesus, and they'd have excellent attendance if he was there, so he invited him to preach for homecoming. And Jesus accepted.

He showed up that morning, and the place was packed; everyone was excited to hear from Jesus, the hometown hero. He grabbed the prophet Isaiah's scroll and began preaching out of Isaiah 61 and 58. "The Spirit of the Lord is on me because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." And tells them that this scripture has been fulfilled in their hearing. And everyone clapped and shouted amen; what a great sermon! They were shocked; this was Joseph's son, right. He is all grown up. Everything was great.

<u>UNTIL</u>

He got to the next part of his sermon, the illustration. Jesus, being a good preacher, anticipated they would ask him to do some miracles. So, Jesus tells two stories about people who were healed by God. In Elijah's time, Elijah was sent to heal one person, a widow in Zarephath. And in Elisha's time, many people had leprosy, but the only one that was cleansed was Naaman, the Syrian. After this, the scripture says, "All the people in the synagogue were furious when they heard this" (v. 28). They were so mad that they tried to throw him off a cliff (v. 29).

I'm glad I've never preached a sermon that made you all want to throw me off a cliff. But Jesus gave an illustration that set people off. And the reason why is this. The first part of Jesus' sermon was all about the good news of grace. God has grace available for you. The great grace promised in Isaiah has been fulfilled in you. Hearing it is showing up for you. Everyone LOVES that message. But Jesus says it's also showing up for the people you don't like. Jesus gives two examples of people who were outside of Israel and healed by God's grace. And just as those two were, many others, outsiders will become insiders. This was a message the people didn't want to hear.

It's a powerfully challenging message. How do we extend grace to others, the same grace God extended to ourselves? Jesus gives another parable in Matthew 18:21-35 about an unforgiving servant with a significant debt forgiven. He finds someone who owes him a much smaller debt and forces him to pay it back. He refuses to operate with the same grace given to him. Unlike that servant, how are we doing the hard work of extending grace and love to all we encounter.
