Dear LUMC Family,

One of my favorite stories about prayer is from a friend of mine. Many years ago, he taught his daughter how to pray. She was a big fan of the show Sesame Street, so he thought, just like they do in the show, the best way for him to teach her was to have her parrot him. So he begins

Dad: Dear God
Daughter: Dear God
Dad: We Thank You
Daughter: We Thank You

Dad: For

Daughter: Five. AH AH AH AH

I laugh every time I think about this story, but I recognize it can be hard to teach and talk about something like prayer, which seems so simple. Especially with kids, who can get some part of it wrong so innocently and innocuously that it turns it from a lesson to a Sesame Street moment. But even simple things are often more challenging than we expect. Prayer is often one of those. Of the many conversations I have with folks about faith and spirituality, prayer is one of the biggest ones. And for many, there is a struggle with many different things around worship.

Everything from How do I pray? What should I say? Should I ask God for stuff or say what I'm grateful for? How long should it be? What happens when I lose focus? All the way to, why didn't God answer that prayer? How come when I talk to God, it doesn't seem like I can hear him? Does it really work? Will my prayer actually change God's mind? Did I not have enough faith in my prayer?

Prayer seems so simple and can be more complicated than it looks. So, for the month of September, I want us to think about prayer in a few ways. One, I want to look at Jesus' pattern of prayer; looking at the Lord's prayer gives us a helpful insight into what we should learn about prayer. Second, I want to talk about how there's no proper method of prayer. Much like a toolbox full of tools, the great saints of the faith have come up with all sorts of ways to pray: Adoration, Petition, Lament, Contemplation, and so on. Each one is like a different tool in our spiritual toolbox. If we don't change up the tools we need, it would be like repairing a house with just a hammer. That hammer helps pull nails out of the wall or drive them in. But what about when you need to use a screw or lay some tile.

Let's get more direct. Maybe you often talk to God, but you need to be still before God? Maybe on the other end, you bear your stress and burdens because you don't want to bother God, and you need to share with God.

Lastly, I want to teach us a simple method for prayer that came to me from Pete Greig's book How to Pray. He talks about the P.R.A.Y. method of prayer. Pause, Rejoice, Ask, Yield. This simple framework, I think, helps us cover a variety of different ways that we can talk to God. In our busy world, it allows us to pause and slow ourselves down. When we can so easily focus on all the negatives in our lives, we can look beyond that limited view and find God's joy all around us. We're invited to share our needs before God when we're encouraged to keep our problems to ourselves. And finally, in a world of control, we're asked in prayer to yield. We should give up some of that control to the one who controls everything.

At its heart, prayer should reflect our dynamic relationship with God. There is more than one way for us to talk with God; when we do so, we'll discover the richness and depth of our relationship with God. Blessings.




DIY Fall Paint Night


Plants can be taken home after the Christmas Eve Service.

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

Karios

Kairos Prison Ministry International (KPMI) is a ministry of the church ... a ministry of the apostles whom Jesus Christ has called into community and sent forth into the environment of correctional institutions. Kairos Prison Ministry shares the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ to incarcerated men, women, youth and their families. Kairos sprang grew from the Cursillo movement and is supported by volunteers from the 4th Day movements such as Cursillo, National Episcopal Cursillo, Presbyterian Cursillo, Lutheran Via de Cristo, The Upper Room's Walk To Emmaus, and independently ecumenical Tres Dias as well as volunteers from independent and nondenominational churches. As a ministry, Kairos embraces a diverse group of volunteers working together to fulfill Christ's call to action in Matthew 25:36. KPMI has been called the best example of the early church in existence today. Kairos incorporates curriculum designed to build and encourage pro-social character and behavior. Society spends over \$60 billion/yr. to keep 2.3 million inmates incarcerated. The Kairos program, 100% funded by private donations, is offered at no cost to State and Federal Institutions. It's best illustrated by an inmate's witness, "It's been said that it cost the government \$1 million to keep me locked up and a \$250 program from Kairos set me free".
